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Store

With 2013 already off to a roaring start, let's reflect on what an amazingly productive year we had in 2012. We generated the highest annual sales in Home ReSource's ten year history. It was a result of increased organization, surges in inventory coming in from Deconstruction projects, assistance from a variety of work programs, and new faces in the store everyday. We moved mountains of lumber. The majority came from the Missoula Mercantile Deconstruction project, but we also continue to offer local, sustainably harvested Bad Goat Wood Products and locally reclaimed lumber from Heritage Timber. We also introduced new products from GreenCrete, a local company that manufactures pavers with recycled glass.

Along with the day to day work that goes on in the store, moving cabinets, loading doors, sorting hardware, we continued to make many large and small improvements to the functionality of the space. We constructed storage bins for our inventory of ducting and stove pipe and replaced our inefficient and deteriorating garage door with an insulated one. By reassessing our recycling process and reorganizing and modifying our bins for faster turnaround at the recycling center, we exceeded store recycling projections. We began a faucet testing and repairing program and reorganized the paint shed, certifying and labeling every can. Staff and work program participants also participated in a variety of trainings, increasing practical skills and knowledge. With a dedicated staff and an army of work program participants and volunteers, things move fast around here. We push our mission forward, and we continue to provide people with materials, opportunities, and inspiration.



Downtown Missoula is rich in history, and if you get a chance to look at some of the old pictures of the downtown area, you realize that those old western towns with wooden board walks and dirt streets teeming with cars and horses alike weren't just scenery in a spaghetti western, they were reality. The Missoula Mercantile Building certainly plays a prominent role in the story of our downtown. It is also the place where Lauren's grandmother, Annabelle McGeorge, had her first job. This summer Home ReSource took part in a historic project that included the demolition and salvage of the interior of the old building. The "Merc" as some call it, had seen many remodels over the years, so finding some of the more historic pieces took some digging. Buried behind layers of sheetrock and 2x4s there were old oak banisters and fir flooring. In the basement, underneath old pine floorboards, the crew found bottles of early tinctures and square head nails. Much of the historic elements stayed put, and that is a good thing as it helps retain the building's historic nature, but literally tons of the other materials were salvaged and were able to make their way into hundreds of Montana homes. This project was just one of many our Deconstruction crew was a part of last year, but it really brought home the connections we have with our surroundings and how Home Resource just keeps those connections going.

Programs

2012 was a year of growth for Home ReSource work programs. These programs provide on-the-job training to underserved populations facing economic challenges. Great strides were made in the structure and effectiveness of the programs through the work of Home ReSource's first Americorp VISTA member, Hannah Kooistra. Hannah works to strengthen existing partnerships and forge new relationships with local agencies who serve clients with barriers-to-employment. Program participants currently enrolled in the program include seniors, at-risk youth, veterans, those who were formerly incarcerated, and individuals with disabilities. Through exposure to reuse and processing strategies, hands-on building projects, and customer service, participants graduate the program prepared to meet the needs of employers engaged in the rising green building trade.

In the past year four individuals who completed 3-6 months of vocational training at Home ReSource have found gainful employment. Program participant Chris Moles of Missoula was referred to Home ReSource through an agency that offers a temporary work opportunity while permanent employment or educational advancement is sought. Three months of work experience and a positive reference led Chris to secure permanent employment as a maintenance manager for a local low income housing complex.

The success of these programs is felt mutually as we begin to enrich our community through inclusive environmental education opportunities. By creating pathways to high quality, living wage employment and encouraging a culture of reuse, Home ReSource continues the mission of promoting a more sustainable and vibrant local economy.



Education

In 2012 Home ReSource hosted 176 students and 24 classes through our adult education programs. Class topics covered electrical, plumbing, drywall, tile, door rehabilitation and rehanging, basic and intermediate woodworking, and house framing options—the most common questions we encounter from our customers.



We currently have three part-time employees and five work training program participants rehabilitating cabinets, furniture, faucets, and light fixtures, as well as producing new products made from salvaged materials.

Additionally, we work with Willard Alternative High School to host several woodworking classes each year. The school lacks industrial arts facilities; thus, our partnership allows Willard teachers to expand their curriculum offerings. Students experience new opportunities for green building industry career pursuits, and Home ReSource diversifies our positive impacts in the Missoula community. The students used local, sustainably harvested wood to build a picnic bench for public use near the school grounds and built bird houses for native species. We believe exposing adolescents to a combination of reuse/ecological concepts and practical skills will better prepare them to pursue new approaches to solve the challenges our society faces.

Events

Thanks so much to everyone who participated in Spontaneous Construction 2013 and the Benefit Auction.

Over the course of the six hour contest, we were pleased to see contestants use every kind of building materials from our store to create their awesome creations. The resulting outdoor dining tables, bathroom vanities, greenhouses, a block printing press, scary sculptures, lamps, and tables were all quite amazing, and greatly added to our Benefit Auction. To fill out the contest day, we were helped enormously by the educational demonstrations from local nonprofits and businesses, as well as by the never-ending supply of delicious food from several local vendors. At the end of the day, it felt quite rewarding to give all the contest participants prizes for their efforts, passing along the generosity provided by many local businesses. As night fell we enjoyed live music by the local bands Soul City Brass Band and The Best Westerns, and even the most staid got funky on the dancefloor. It was the best year yet for our signature event, and we'll have even more fun next year.

The "local celebrity" judges selected the ten best pieces from Spontaneous Construction for our Benefit Auction, which took place at The DoubleTree on October 19th. Amidst a tremendous outpouring of community support, there were speeches aplenty, the structured chaos of live auction bidding wars overseen by a gracious and professional auctioneer, a competitive silent auction, and the satisfactory mmms and ahhhs of delicious hors d'oeuvres, catered dinner, and local beer and wine. Altogether, the Benefit Auction reaffirmed our sense that we live in a bountiful, interdependent community in which everyone provides for each other.
